Auto Security

Thefts of two particular car brands have been on the rise after gaining popularity on social media. We are warning residents of a local increase in car thefts of Kia and Hyundai brand vehicles. The thefts are mainly of Kia cars newer than 2011 and Hyundai cars newer than 2015 with standard key ignitions.

The thefts have been on the rise nationally after tips showing how to start these cars without the use of a key were posted on social media. Thieves are simply joy riding the vehicles or using them to commit other crimes. The vehicles are then left abandoned in most cases soon after the theft.

To prevent yourself from becoming a victim, we recommend:

- Buy a steering wheel lock
- Lock your car
- Make sure the alarm is on
- Park in well-lit areas or garage
- Use camera surveillance systems

Scam Alert!

The Kent County Sheriff's Office is warning residents of law enforcement impersonation phone calls. This is a reminder that the KCSO will never solicit payment for fines or bond over the phone.

In the most recent scam, a fraudulent caller posing as a law enforcement officer threatens to arrest the victim if money is not sent. Typically, the reason given by the caller is to pay fines for outstanding warrants. The callers will often "spoof," or fake, their phone numbers so the call appears to be coming from a local police department, like the Kent County Sheriff's Office.

The callers will often ask you to obtain a prepaid credit card from a local store and provide them with the credit card number. Once the money is taken from the credit card, there is very little law enforcement can do to identify the suspect and recover the money.

The callers often threaten to extort victims with physical or financial harm or the release of sensitive data. They are becoming more sophisticated and organized in their approach, are technologically savvy, and often target young persons and the elderly.

To protect yourself from falling victim to scams, be wary of answering phone calls from numbers you do not recognize. Never give out your personal information, including banking information. Do not send money to anybody that you do not personally know and trust, including those claiming to be law enforcement officers. If in doubt, hang up and contact the person they are claiming to be or report to local authorities.

Township Master Plan Now Underway

WE'RE LISTENING!

An update to the Township's Master Plan is currently underway. The Plan is a policy document that guides where and how growth will occur in Ada Township. For this process to be a success, public involvement is key. Open and inclusive conversations have been happening this summer to gather diverse viewpoints from residents, business and property owners, civic and neighborhood groups, local officials, and everyone else that is interested in Ada Township. Focus groups, pop-up listening stations at local events, and an online community survey culminated in a community visioning event on Tuesday, August 16th where community voices contributed to creating a bold vision for Ada's future.

As a result of this Public Engagement effort, in conversations at the Ada Library, Music on the Lawn, and the Ada Farmers Market, as well as input received from the online survey, a total of over 500 participants shared their opinions on the issues facing Ada, as well as opportunities for change. Many reflected on current experiences, the Township's physical constraints, and the desired character of the community. For example, we've heard the following:

Positive aspects of Ada:

- Recreational green space in Ada Township (natural features including two rivers, trails/paths, open space, places for kids to play).
- A sense of community (vibrant village core, citizen/community care and involvement, high commitment to the common good).

- Safe community (low crime, safe place to live/work/play/visit).
- Public school system (schools attract residents to the community).
- Small-town, historical feel (diverse village area businesses, new walkable village area, strong planning and design, appropriate scale).
- Local business presence (mix/variety of local businesses that meet local needs).

Challenges in Ada:

- Travel speeds and circulation patterns (traffic and congestion).
- Parking availability (parking options specifically for events and on weekends).
- Housing affordability (diversity of housing options for families, seniors, and diverse income levels).
- Diversity (lack of economic and racial/ethnic diversity).
- Vehicular and pedestrian safety (underpass area slope and visibility, crosswalk areas).

Future opportunities for Ada:

- Expanding recreation and activities (more trails and parks, trail connections, play areas for kids).
- Improved access and safety for pedestrians and cars (managing traffic, roads, and parking areas).
- Intentional planning for future development in Ada (more workforce housing especially near employment centers/business areas, longevity of community, more housing density in village area, providing pedestrian connections from village area to commercial areas on Fulton to the west).
- Biking infrastructure (improving crosswalks, keeping bikes off main roads, more trails and connections especially between the village area and parks).
- Business variety (restaurant and retail that are more affordable).

UPCOMING MASTER PLAN EFFORTS

No yard waste (branches, leaves, etc.), tires, oil-based paints, toxic chemicals, inflammable materials (gas, propane)



IT'S TIME TO CUT & TREAT THOSE BITTERSWEET VINES

Oriental Bittersweet (*Celastrus orbiculata*) is recognized by long vines that "wind" up trees and showy red and yellow fruits. As the vines make their way up trees, they restrict sap flow, cover the tree leaves and eventually kill the tree. They can be seen along many roadsides and in woodlots throughout Ada Township.

Removal takes some care and can be done summer through the winter. Be careful not to pull down on vines that may cause overhead branches to fall. Use loppers or pruners to cut the vines at the ground level and as high as you can reach. It is best to apply an

herbicide to the cut section near the ground, being cautious not to get any on you, nearby plants, or the ground. If you wish to avoid use of herbicides, you will need to revisit the site to pull out small new vines that will start to grow in the area. Woody sections of cut vines can be left to decompose, but any berries should be bagged and put in the trash.

FALL TRAILS UPDATE

You know it is summer when everyone is out on the wonderful non-motorized trail system Ada has to offer! This summer residents have not only seen paving of new sections of trail (Pettis Ave.), but also fixing existing segments (Ada Dr.) that needed repair.

2022 Construction Project Update:



The main project currently under construction is a 4.2 mile stretch of Pettis Avenue from Knapp St. to the Chief Hazy Cloud Park entrance. We are thankful to Kent County Parks for allowing us to utilize Chief Hazy Cloud Park property where possible to make a truly distinct trail experience for our residents and guests. Please check out our website at www.adatownshipmi.com and click "Departments – Parks & Recreation – Trails", for pictures and videos highlighting the work done to date. This section should be complete and usable in October of this year.

The section of non-motorized trail on Pettis Ave. from Knapp St. to 3 Mile Rd. has been delayed as the Township has not been able to secure easements from the necessary property owners. The Township only wants to construct safe non-motorized trails and an easement is required for this section. The Township has no plans to proceed with this section unless easements are secured.

The Township has two projects that it still hopes to construct in 2022; these two paths include Kamp Twins connecting Fase St. to Buttrick Ave. and Hall Street connecting to Spaulding Avenue. These projects are currently delayed slightly due to some railroad permitting issues on the Kamp Twins section, but the hope is these items will be resolved shortly.

At its August 8th Township Board Meeting the Township Awarded Corbin Design the Non-Motorized Wayfinding Signage Project. The Township will now work with Corbin to create a wayfinding signage plan for the Township trail network that will provide directional signage, information kiosks, maps and mileage markers throughout the network. This will allow the Township to communicate to trail users about everything Ada has to offer.

The Trails Committee is still finalizing the project list for 2023. One highlighted project will include a path underneath the Fulton St. bridge at the Grand River providing an additional connection for residents to travel from Legacy Park to the north side of Fulton crossing the Grand River. The Township is also exploring Phase II of the Pettis Avenue trail to connect the phase under construction currently to Vergennes St., a path on Rix from Ada Drive to Adaridge as well as looking at the other segments that will provide maximum connectivity for residents.

Staff is still working on putting out a bid to contractors for large scale repairs throughout the existing system. This will be an annual process to make sure the Township is properly maintaining the system, not only building new.
