


THE VAN ANDEL FAMILY PAVILION IN LEGACY PARK

KENT COUNTY SHERIFF OFFICE NEWS –

Greetings from your East Precinct Community Officer. I hope everyone is having a great summer and getting outside to

enjoy the beautiful weather. It's hard to believe that it is August already. One of my tasks each week is reviewing all the reports that are taken in the East Precinct. In doing so, I occasionally notice certain crime trends. I would like to discuss one particular crime trend and offer some advice on how to avoid becoming a victim.



The crime we are talking about is fraud. There are several common scams being used right now to fraudulently obtain money from individuals. The first is a telephone scam where the caller claims to be a legal representative for a family member who is currently in jail in another state. The caller convinces the victim that money is needed immediately for bond to get the family member out of jail. There are also telephone scams involving fake IRS agents and fake law enforcement officials. In both these scams, money is demanded to prevent a warrant from being issued.

There are many other scams as well, but these are the most prevalent right now. Regardless of the scam, there are several tips to avoid becoming a victim of these scams. First, limit the amount of personal information you put on social media. The suspects of these crimes are becoming more and more sophisticated and are regularly using social media to gather information about their victims. Second, never send cash through the mail and never pay anything by means of an iTunes or similar gift card. No official transaction is ever handled via gift cards. Last, never make a quick decision when someone is demanding payment for anything. If you are unsure, take a moment and call a friend or family member, or better yet call me. I would be happy to offer my advice on any calls/emails you receive demanding money. I would much rather give you advice beforehand, than read a report about you losing thousands of dollars to a scam several weeks later.

address on your home, in a contrasting color, to make it easier to be seen from the road. This is even more important when your home is farther off the road. If you have a shared drive, can we tell which way to your home? The fire department sells reflective address signs. Give us a call to order one and we'll have the sign made before you arrive to pick it up. If you have questions as to where to place the sign, we can stop out and show you. The signs are only \$15.

ADA/CASCADE FALL CLEAN-UP DAY Saturday, October 12, 2019 Forest Hills Central Middle School

FOR: Ada and Cascade Township residents. Identification is required to verify your residency within the townships of Ada or Cascade. If you live in Grand Rapids Township but your mailing address is Ada, you do not qualify.



WHEN: Saturday, October 12, 2019 from 8:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Gates close sharply at 2:30 p.m.

WHERE: Forest Hills Central Middle School parking lot ONE WAY ENTRY FROM ADA DRIVE, EXIT HALL DRIVE. Enter via Ada Drive near Alta Dale by Central Middle School.

WHAT: Non-hazardous household waste, appliances, scrap metal, electronics for recycling (computers, TVs, etc.), household items for re-use, office paper for shredding.

NO YARD WASTE. You will need to use leaf pick-up day, your curb side service or other source for yard waste such as leaves, branches and brush.

NO HAZARDOUS MATERIAL such as paint (open and dried paint cans okay), cleaners, batteries or other hazardous material will be accepted. A Household Hazardous Waste Drop-Off event is set for October 19.

Services on Site:



Republic Services: For general trash and junk, appliances, scrap metal. No yard waste.



Salvation Army: For used or new household items such as furniture, kitchen items and clothes. Donation receipts available.

Shred-it* Shred-It: For shredding of office paper, personal files and other documents. Up to 100 lbs. of personal sensitive documents.



Comprenew: For electronic items such as computers, televisions and small appliances, cell phones, household batteries. (Large appliances are accepted by Republic Services.)

HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE **DROP-OFF DAY – SafeChem Collection**

Date:	Saturday, October 19, 2019
Time:	9:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.
Location:	Cascade Fire Station 2990 Buttrick Ave. SE, Cascade, MI

This is an opportunity to safely remove and dispose of unwanted hazardous materials from your home. It is for households in Kent County only, not businesses.

BRING: oil-based paint and thinner, fertilizers, pool and photo chemicals, bug spray and weed killer, fluorescent tubes and CFL bulbs, cleaning products, fire extinguishers, gasoline, antifreeze, motor oil, mercury thermostat and thermometer, aerosol cans.

DO NOT BRING: latex paint, alkaline batteries, medication, needles, fireworks, ammunition, propane, tires, containers larger than 5-gallons, business and non-Kent County wastes.

It is recommended to keep "like" containers together. Do not mix the waste with other materials. Maintain labeling so it can be clearly seen. Any leaking or potentially dangerous chemicals should be placed in a bucket for secondary containment. It is recommended to place all items <u>upright in a</u> lined box and/or a plastic tote. You may transport vehicle fluids (oil, gas, antifreeze) in original/approved containers as fluids can be bulked and containers returned to resident.

ELECTION NEWS –

Although we don't anticipate any more elections until March 2020, there are always things going on behind the scenes.
