

ADA TOWNSHIP ENHANCES MANAGEMENT TEAM FOR THE FUTURE Appoints First Full-Time Township Manager

Ada Township has made significant investment in recent years in new public facilities and amenities amid private sector redevelopment that has brought new businesses and housing to the Ada Village area. With generous philanthropic support, the recent completion of a new riverfront park and planned opening in January 2021 of a new KDL branch library and community center building have energized the community and its

residents despite our ongoing public health challenges and constraints.

In an effort to maintain this trajectory, Ada has adopted a new model of governance to include a full-time township manager, naming Julius Suchy to this newly created position, effective mid-September. The manager will support the Township's ongoing growth and enhance the Township's capacity to effectively and efficiently deliver high-quality public services and facilities to Ada residents. This addition to the Township's leadership team will also provide the opportunity to

collaborate even more fully in the future with the county, state and neighboring communities to offer ongoing efficiency and savings as the community continues to invest and grow.

Suchy currently serves as Sparta Village Manager, a position he has held since 2014. With a strong focus on making Sparta a "business-friendly" community, he initiated a full slate of projects to support existing business and attract new businesses to the village. Suchy was named the Grand Rapids Business Journal 2016 "Newsmaker of the Year" in recognition of his work in economic development.

"Julius brings a wealth of experience in local government management and a solid track record of strategic growth and strong partner relationships," said George Haga, Ada Township Supervisor. "I have every confidence that Julius's drive and vision will make him an asset to Ada Township, aligning well with Ada's plans for the future."

Prior to his work in Sparta, Suchy held a number of local government positions, including Dundee Village Manager, Vassar City Manager and Big Rapids Zoning Administrator.

Suchy holds a Bachelor of Arts and a Master's Degree in Public Administration from Grand Valley State University.






KENT COUNTY SHERIFF OFFICE NEWS –

Over the past few months there has been a rise in vehicle thefts and theft from motor vehicles throughout

FIRE PREVENTION MONTH

October is Fire Prevention month and your Ada Firefighters will be visiting all the elementary schools and preschools in the Township. Each grade from preschool to fourth grade will get a different fire prevention demonstration and message. Thanks to our many area sponsors we are also able to provide coloring books for each grade level and, of course, a fire helmet for the younger kids.

This month will also give you a chance to review your home fire safety plan in the

event of a fire. Here are just a few quick things to have in your home and tips for a safe plan.

Smoke detectors are life savers!

Replace your batteries twice a year. Have a detector on each floor and in every bedroom. The life of a detector is 10 years; replace it if it's older than 10.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) detectors are equally important. CO is an odorless and deadly gas; make sure you have a working detector.

Fire extinguishers can control or extinguish a small fire before the fire department arrives, but always call 911 first!

Always have two ways out of every room. Have a preplanned meeting place for the family to meet in the event of a fire.

24-hour Coverage

February marked our completion of the first year of 24-hour staffing at Fire Station One. This was also our busiest year ever, reaching 755 responses. Prior to then our staffing was a Monday-Friday 8-5 schedule. The new staffing gets an apparatus in route to an emergency 5 minutes quicker than in previous years. Beyond the reduced response times, the new schedule allows us to be more active in the community. We can now provide evening tours for Boy Scout & Girl Scout Troops, as well as assisting with events such as Tinsel Treats & Trollies and the Beers at the Bridge concert series. If you have a group that wishes to tour the station or learn more about fire safety or first aid, give us a call to set up a time.

Paid on Call Firefighters

Our department relies heavily on a dedicated, paid on call staff of firefighters, all of whom also have a full-time career. They respond to larger incidents, such as car accidents and structure fires, as well as fill evening shifts with the 24-hour firefighter. This allows us to have a minimum of two responders from 8am-11pm, which is sufficient for the majority of our responses. Over the past 10 months we have had four of our members complete their Fire Academy and Medical First Responder training. Congratulations and welcome to Rob McCarty, Matt Donald, Vince Guinsler and Ryan Green. This fall we will have two people attending the Fire Academy at the Plainfield FD: Rory Velting and Paul McDonagh.

FARMER'S MARKET

Late summer and early fall vegetables put on a show of deeply saturated colors – not like those flashy bright greens, reds, and yellows of spring and summer. Water-laden fruits and veg are replaced by dense root vegetables rich in minerals, vitamin C, and flavor – all immune system boosts for the days short on sunshine.

It's as if the sun is putting every bit of energy into making sure we remember those warm days as the weather transitions to cooler temperatures. There indeed were a lot of hot, sunny market days this year to remember. In fact, it's how we started out in June. It was all about high 80 and 90-degree days. Many folks took us up on the idea of getting to the market at 9am to grab fresh produce before the heat ramped up.

As the market winds down during the last weeks of the season, keep gathering those late-season fruits and produce. Look for pumpkins, butternut and winter squash. Their flesh is packed with beta-carotene and immune system—boosting vitamins A and C, just like those summer fruits. Scoop them out to create an antioxidant-rich puree and add it to risotto, pancakes, or even smoothies.

Bring home Brussels sprouts and dark leafy kale when spinach and arugula are fading away. Both can keep your digestion healthy in the winter months, and Brussels sprouts are actually high in protein!

Choose purple cabbages as a replacement for blueberries and red peppers. Like their summer precedents, purple cabbage is rich in antioxidants and can be added to cold salads or hot stir fry.

There's more: apples, green cabbage, cauliflower, and parsnips. Any of these added to a meal helps keep your body healthy through winter and spring.

Hopefully, our luck with the weather continues through the remainder of the season and the bounty we've seen all summer is equally rich this fall.

Speaking of luck, we are always thankful for ours. We have loyal shoppers who support the local growers and food crafters in the market. We also have a great group of volunteers here, year after year – many of them at least four years. They are the ones managing everything from pre-market setup to putting it all away, plus everything in-between. This year, they helped direct one-way traffic, made sure sanitizer stations were available and sold masks. Certainly not the usual list of responsibilities, but they made sure those extra things were done to keep everything running smoothly.

Please thank them when you see them. Without our volunteers' gift of help each week, we can't run the market as efficiently. Their smiling faces are in the photo below.

We look forward to seeing your faces smiling at the market, too, happy to be part of a community that values our local food producers. We are very fortunate to have the opportunity to make this market happen each Tuesday during the season. Buying at the market improves your health, your community, and the environment. Thank you for making it an essential part of your week.

UPCOMING EXHIBIT ON ADA'S FUR TRADING YEARS

We hope to welcome you this fall to explore the interesting people, cultures, and activities of Ada's early fur-trading years in a new permanent exhibit, *Ada Is...Rooted In Trade*. Be on the lookout for information soon on the exhibit opening date.

In 1969, a five-ton propeller from a generator at Ada's dam was lifted from the bottom of the river, painted, and put on display by the Ada Covered Bridge. It became known as "Ada's Dam Thing" and "Ada's Calder" in reference to Grand Rapids' new Calder statue installed that same year.

Looking back, the August primary is behind us. Ada saw a 40% turnout with a large part of that being absentee. The trails millage passed overwhelmingly. Looking forward, the presidential election, which happens once every four years, is typically the biggest election we hold. It is scheduled for Tuesday, November 3. While Michigan now allows voter registration and absentee ballot requests almost up to the end, please, please register and/or request your absentee ballot as soon as possible. PARK RULES AND USE

COVID-19: Some facilities and amenities may be temporarily closed. Social Distancing is to be practiced.

Park Hours: Park grounds are open dawn to dusk.

Dog Policy: Township ordinances require dogs to be on a leash and cleaned up after in all parks and preserves.

Motorized recreation vehicles are not allowed.

Alcohol is not allowed in the parks or park facilities.
