RIVERS, BRIDGES AND CONNECTING COMMUNITY

Thornapple Rivers has long been a special place. For hundreds of years we, the people of Ada, have enjoyed these rivers and the beautiful land through which they run. As we have been reporting to you regularly in this newsletter, Ada Township is continuing its extensive efforts to make these river areas even more accessible to you.

Ada Township recently completed miles of pedestrian and bicycle paths on both sides of the Grand River in the central and north parts of the Township. Plans are also underway, in partnership with other governmental entities, to begin construction of the pedestrian bridge connecting Roselle Park and Chief Hazy Cloud Park in 2026, and to begin construction of the pedestrian crossing of the Grand River at Knapp Street in 2025. At the same time, we have been reporting to you the Township's securing of almost all of the land on both sides of the Thornapple River from the historic Ada Covered Bridge to the confluence of the



rivers. What we are so pleased to announce to you now, is that the funding

and planning to make major improvements to that downtown river corridor is a reality, a reality thanks in large part to a public/private partnership known as the "Connecting Community" campaign.

This newsletter contains visual concept plans of what the improved riverfront areas will become. It includes a cool pedestrian bridge running from Legacy Park across the Thornapple River to a new 14-acre park preserve with trails on the east side of the river connecting to the Grand River natual Area Preserve. That park with trails will run all the way from Thornapple River Drive to where the rivers meet. The campaign also includes millions of dollars of investment and improvements on both sides of the river between the historic Ada Covered Bridge and that new pedestrian bridge from Legacy Park. Those improvements include, as you can see in the concept plans, family gathering spaces, picnic areas, green spaces, river overlooks, walking paths, a dog park, pickleball courts, a splash pad, new bathrooms, veteran's memorial, additional parking and even a kayak launch.

This beautiful, large, useable greenspace will compliment the new shops, restaurants, and businesses in the same area.

Mark Twain, who grew up on the Mississippi River, once wrote "The river has great wisdom and whispers its secrets to the hearts of all people." Spending time by our rivers is good for us. And it is our hope that these new public riverfront facilities, rooted in our history, will be a place to grow families, connect with friends, and spend time in personal reflection for generations to come.

FROM THE CLERK'S OFFICE

As another tax season commences July 1, 2024 with the mailing of your summer tax bill, one of the most frequent questions we receive is what do we do with your tax dollars?

Contrary to perception, Ada Township does not maintain all of those dollars. In fact, it is quite the opposite. As the chart below denotes, the majority of the tax dollars we

collected in 2023 goes towards K-12 education. We collect those education dollars on behalf of the State of Michigan and the Forest Hills, Lowell, Kent Intermediate, and Northview School Districts. In this instance, for every \$100 we collect of your taxes, \$62.70 goes to those aforementioned entities dependent on the school district you live in.

Ada Township in totality collects \$12.88 for every \$100 you pay in taxes. You can see in the chart how those tax dollars get disbursed further. I hope this sheds some additional light on your tax dollars at work.



PLANNING AND ZONING

Zoning Ordinance Update - Public Input

Over the next year or more, the Planning Department expects to update the Ada Township Zoning Ordinance, and welcomes any input that interested parties may wish to provide. The primary goals of this update are:

- Reorganize the Ordinance for simplification and transparency for the public and developers. This will include the use of tables, charts, and illustrations to effectively illustrate zoning requirements.
- Implement goals of the 2023 Master Plan, including consideration of a variety of residential options.
- Enact minor revisions to reflect updated development standards, legal rulings (regarding issues such as sign regulations), and to minimize repetition and inconsistencies.

This effort will be led by Township Staff and a Zoning Ordinance Review Committee consisting of members of the Planning Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals.

Downtown Ada "Ada Village" Parking Study

A new parking study is tentatively planned to take place during the summer or fall of 2024. The study's timeframe will be determined based on the completion of the current large-scale projects in the area, including the Ada

Hotel and the adjacent commercial-office building at 7399 River Street.

This project, which will be a joint effort of the Township and the Downtown Development Authority (DDA), will obtain accurate parking counts and develop recommendations for future parking programming in the Downtown "Village" area. This new study will replace a previous study conducted in 2017, prior to the major redevelopment efforts that have taken place in the area.

ASSESSING UPDATE

It is that time of year again for our office to conduct our annual residential reviews. Homeowners in the selected residential neighborhood review area will receive a letter and questionnaire from our office in the mail. We encourage homeowners to complete and return the questionnaire to help us make sure we have current and accurate information.

Conducting a review of Township properties is not only a requirement of the State of Michigan

but also a way for us to make sure our records are accurate for fair and equitable assessments.

Our residential appraisers will review the information, along with current property record card and recent aerial photography, and prepare

the record card for next year's market study and valuation. Part of this review process is to visit each property and take an exterior picture of the outside of the front of the home. Our vehicles are marked with the Ada Township logo and our assessing staff should always carry a photo ID and present when requested.

ROAD CONSTRUCTION

The following is a listing of street maintenance projects planned for 2024.

The Kent County Road Commission will be completing a Millings (Recycled Asphalt Pavement) Application to the following gravel roads. This application will be used to strengthen the base of the gravel roads similar to the work that was completed on 2 Mile Road last year. Work is expected to take place during the spring and summer of 2024.

- Conservation Street Honey Creek Ave. to the west until it reaches the paved portion
- Cramton Avenue Conservation St. to 2 Mile Rd.
- Leonard Street Cramton Ave. to Honey Creek Ave.



The Kent County Road Commission will be completing 13.35 miles of chip seal on the following streets. Work is expected to take place during the Spring and Summer of 2024.

- Ada Drive Forest Hills Avenue to Rix Dr.
- Spaulding Ave. Cascade Road to Ada Dr.
- Thornapple River Dr. River Street to Cascade Rd.
- Vergennes St. Pettis Ave. to Boynton Ave.
- Honey Creek Ave. 4 Mile Rd. to Conservation St.
- Alta Dale Ave. Grand River Dr. to Fulton St.

The Kent County Road Commission will be completing 1.84 miles of seal coat on the following streets. Work is expected to take place during the spring and summer of 2024.

- Fox Hollow Ave. Hall St. to Ada Dr.
- Michigan St. Steketee Ave. to Grand River Dr.



Part of the Ada History Center are the beautiful park-like gardens and grounds. We welcome you to come explore, particularly during the beautiful summer months. The property features several types of gardens including a farm garden, woodland garden, and dahlia garden. These are maintained by a talented and dedicated group of volunteer Master Gardeners. Also, you'll find a memorial to this area's first settler Rix Robinson, a barn quilt block patterned after a quilt in the museum's historic collections, various farm-themed sculptures and yard art. Even the privy is historic!

The biggest feature however is the 1870s barn. A familiar landmark, it stands out, in part, because we don't often find barns in the middle of towns these days. The barn pre-dates most other buildings in the village.

From the riverside farms of this area's Indigenous peoples to the settlement that began in the 1830s, Ada was always a farming community. The History Center barn, originally located next to today's The Community Church, was moved down the street in 1999, repurposed as an ambassador to share Ada's agrarian past.

Inside the barn, which is used for events and fundraisers, are exhibits of farming equipment, a sleigh, a buggy, carpentry and cobbler's tools, and more.

Ada History Center is proud to share the lovely green space and invites you to wander and enjoy.

In 1971, the "Central" was added because of the construction of Forest Hills Northern High School. Another 33 years of growth led to the addition of Forest Hills Eastern High School in 2004.

SUMMER ON THE TRAILS

Below is a short update on the Ada Township Trail System. If you are interested in learning more, please visit our website and click "Departments -Parks & Recreation - Trails.

Pettis Avenue Phase II (Chief Hazy Cloud Entrance to Vergennes St.)

Our attempt to seek funding to offset the funding gap of \$6.5 million to build a pedestrian bridge across the Grand River behind Amway was unsuccessful. The trail committee has reviewed this section again and is recommending for the Township to move forward with the path in the original location on the north side of Pettis Ave.

Wayfinding Signage

The signage plan is complete and the next step is to go out to bid for fabrication of the signage and installation. It is anticipated that bids will be received early this summer with fabrication and installation taking place in the late summer/fall.

An example of one of the guide signs is shown here.

Knapp Street Pedestrian Bridge

The project is currently under design and is slated to be constructed in 2025/2026. This is a partnership between Ada Township (\$4M) and Downtown

> Grand Rapids Inc, via the Grand River Greenway Project (\$3.5M). This bridge will be located on the south side of Knapp Street.

Thornapple River Pedestrian Bridge

This pedestrian bridge is currently being designed and will then go through EGLE review and bidding. It is currently projected to be constructed in 2025.

Staff is currently evaluating where along the system the Township should place benches, waste receptacles, bike fix stations, or other amenities important to the user experience on the trail system. The plan will include what will be added, where it will be added and what the timeline for that installation will be.



PUBLIC SAFETY UPDATES



With the summer season fast approaching and warmer weather ahead, I am looking forward to attending several of Ada's events! We are so fortunate to have something for everyone here in Ada- whether it be a concert, parade, or car show. These events are a great way to connect with

neighbors, celebrate our growing village and spend quality time with family and friends. It is also the perfect opportunity to connect with me, along with other first responders who work collaboratively to keep our events safe and fun. I wanted to offer a few tips and tricks for enhanced safety for everyone attending a community event.

BE ALERT TO TRAFFIC AND SIGNALS

From the lens of a first responder, one of our key concerns is traffic and how it interacts with event attendees. With any event, there is an influx of pedestrian traffic and therefore it is important for both motorists and those on foot to abide by traffic and crossing signals. Be vigilant and remain aware of people exiting their vehicles parked on the roadway or walking in between parked cars. While it is always important to be free from distractions while driving, be especially cautious around event parking or the event space itself, as individuals may enter the roadway unexpectedly during the event timeframe.

PLAN REUNIFICATION & EXIT STRATEGY

If you plan to attend an event with your children, it is important to establish a plan for reunification if the group becomes separated as well as an exit strategy if there is inclement weather or an unexpected incident interrupts the event itself. Have a special place for kids of any age to go in the event they become lost and make sure it's a place they recognize and would feel comfortable going. Examples might be the Covered Bridge, the playground at Legacy Park, or Ada Fresh Market.

NAME AWARENESS & SEEKING HELP STRATEGIES


Ensure that young children know their first and last name, as well as their parents' full names. You should also tell children to find a police officer, fireman or a mother with other children in the event they become lost or need help. I have witnessed firsthand the effectiveness of a group of Moms coming together to help reunite a lost child while at Legacy Park. If your child becomes lost, do not call out to them. Instead-loudly provide their physical description, clothing, any distinguishing features and lastly their name so the crowd knows who to look for.

PREPARE WITH ESSENTIALS

Parents should ensure phones are well charged and have adequate service in event space areas. Pack basic first aid materials along with adequate water for each family member. I hope for beautiful sunny weather for each of our events so with that said, I'd

encourage you pack sunscreen as well! Make sure everyone has some familiarity with where your vehicle is parked should you have to quickly return to it. If, like me, you walk to most events, plan to have several routes in the event one has heavy traffic or becomes blocked.

Whether you're enjoying the music, marveling at a few sports cars or admiring the parade route, its important to remain aware of your surroundings and occasionally scan your environment. Should you notice anything suspicious, please alert event hosts and ideally law enforcement on site. Event hosts, Ada Township staff, Emergency Management, Ada Fire Department and Kent County Sheriff's Department have worked diligently to ensure our events continue to be a safe space for community members and event attendees. Feel free to reach out with any questions and I look forward to seeing you at our events!

If weather conditions are extremely dry or wind conditions are high, please refrain from burning. Recreational fires such as campfires or in a fire pit are allowed without a permit and can take place after dark. For your permit simply call the Township office weekdays from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. at 616-676-9191.
