## 100 Years of the Robinson Family Reunion will take place on August 12, at Ada Park at noon. They welcome all Robinson descendants to attend!

Every August, descendants of Rix Robinson descend upon Ada. For a century, they have gathered from all over, to enjoy time together, catch up, and remember their common ancestor, the first non-native settler in this area. This summer's reunion will take place on August 12, Ada Park at noon.

The museum grounds host several artifacts related to Rix Robinson: a large stone monument commemorating Robinson's Grand River trading post, the gravestones of

Robinson's parents from New York, and an interpretive panel telling the story of Ada's native peoples, the early fur trade, and Robinson's life.

## KENT COUNTY SHERIFF DEPT – DON'T BE A VICTIM

Fraud is a very common crime to which the Sheriff's Office responds. Last year we took over 1,400 calls from people victimized by fraud. There are several types of frauds and scams out there, but I want to alert you to some of the ones you can easily avoid falling victim to.



**TELEPHONE SCAMS** – Telephone scams are the biggest fraud/scam we respond to. There are many different styles of phone scams, and I have heard some really good ones, but they all boil down to one common factor – <u>MONEY</u>. If someone calls you and claims to be the IRS, POLICE, CONSUMER'S ENERGY, DTE, a GRANDCHILD, a SOFTWARE UPDATE, or someone saying you have won something, and they need you to pay them in a form of prepaid gift card or wire money, it is a <u>SCAM!</u>

As technology progresses, so do the bad guys. They can change the phone number that shows on your caller ID, so please be cautious.

When you receive calls from unknown persons, you should always question WHY. Why are they calling? Why do they need you to pay anything? Why do they need you to pay them in the form of a prepaid gift card? Why is this so urgent?

If there is any question to the authenticity of the call you received, tell the person you are busy and will call them back. The next step is to look up the company on your own and then call them yourself to see if there is a concern.

**CHECK FRAUD** – I have always encouraged people to place their outgoing checks into a post office drop box. At the Sheriff's Office, we still get complaints where someone has had checks taken out of their mailbox and rewritten for another amount or recipient. I understand that locating a post office drop box can be inconvenient, but it is well worth the effort to prevent the headache of someone using your checks without permission.

**CRAIGSLIST** – Craigslist and online marketplaces are great resources to find whatever you're looking for. However, the bad guys use these sites as well to sell stolen or broken goods, to scam people out of their money or items, or even to rob them. There are some simple steps you can take to prevent that from happening.

You should only deal with local sellers. I am not saying all long-distance transactions are scams, but I have taken several complaints about someone renting a condo in Florida, only to arrive and find that there was never a condo waiting at all, so it is important that you use caution.


If you're buying something and the deal sounds too good to be true, it probably is! Remember, most of the items on these sites are exchanged for cash. That means the bad guys know you're bringing cash with you to pay them, and they may even request it specifically. Use your best judgement, trust your instincts, bring a friend with you, and meet in a very public place. That being said, even though a large parking lot is a public place, if the item involved in the transaction is small (such as a phone), it would be wise to meet inside a restaurant or coffee shop, preferably a place you're familiar with and one that has cameras.

If you are using online marketplaces to sell items, you should also consider investing in a counterfeit detector pen. Many businesses use these pens and they will alert you if the money you are given is counterfeit.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS -

#### **CONSTRUCTION HAS STARTED**



This new staffing model will also incorporate our paid on-call firefighters to filling the evening and weekend shifts. If you are interested in becoming a paid on-call member, give the fire department a call at (616) 676-2376. Our on-call members all have fulltime careers and respond when they are available. We provide paid training and retirement for our members, stop by or give us a call to learn more.

#### **ADDRESS SIGNS - CAN WE FIND YOU?**

One of our biggest challenges is locating a house during an emergency. The majority of our responses are in-house medicals with more than half being in the evening and night hours. Take a

look at your house numbers from the street some night. Can you read the house number while in your car? The numbers on your house should contrast to the color of the home. If you are in a rural area, is your address on the roadway and visible from both directions? If your driveway serves multiple homes, is it easy to determine which way to go if the drive splits? If you answered no to any of these questions, we can help you and answer questions you might have. We offer reflective address signs that will assist emergency responders to locate your home. For only \$15 we can make a sign while you wait. Give us a call at (616) 676-2376 or stop by Fire Station 1 at the corner of Fulton & Bronson.

#### **BURN PERMITS**

Just a reminder that during the summer months burning is prohibited south of Fulton. If you live north of Fulton you may burn but must obtain a burn permit first. Call the township office and give your name, address, and contact phone. Permits are good for one week. Regulations are: a person must be present at all times, a method of extinguishment must be available, no burning after dark, and no yard waste is to be burned. We also ask that you watch the weather and avoid burning in dry and/or windy conditions.

#### **COMMUNITY CENTER/LIBRARY DESIGN PROCESS UNDERWAY**

With the architectural team of Progressive AE and OPN Architects now on-board, the Township is moving forward on the design of the planned community center/library building on Headley St., adjacent to The Community Church.

Progressive AE of Grand Rapids was the lead consultant in the preparation of the 2013 Envision Ada Plan for Ada Village as well as the design of the new riverfront park that is now under construction between the new River St. and the Thornapple River. OPN Architect's design process has been informed and proven over the course of more than 30 years studying, planning, and designing 40-plus public libraries of all scales and sizes for equally diverse communities across the country, including Flint and on the Northern Michigan University campus. Together, these two firms will work with the township and community to envision and design a highly flexible, efficient, and innovative community center and library facility that will serve the Village community as a hub for learning and creativity for years to come.



Throughout the design process there will be opportunities for the public to offer insights and wishes for what this community center and library should be. Watch for future announcements regarding public input events in June and July.

#### **CEMETERIES**

Ada Township owns and operates two cemeteries, Ada Cemetery, located at East Fulton and Grand River Drive, and Findlay Cemetery, 7182 Two Mile Road.

Residents of Ada Township may purchase spaces at either cemetery for \$300 each at Ada Township Hall. Note there are additional charges for opening, closing, and restoration of surface for burials. Burial permits are required (typically provided by funeral home).

Please note the following:

- Open for visitation from dawn to dusk
- Findlay Cemetery gate open Wednesdays and weekends May 1 through November 1
- Be respectful of other visitors and other people's graves
- Alcoholic beverages, littering, and hunting are prohibited
- Vehicles on designated roads only 5 mph
- Decorations must be restricted to the area within the lot
- Plantings restricted to flowers only
- Decorations or plantings deemed to hamper maintenance or detract from general appearance may be removed by the township
- Decorations, containers, etc. are to be removed no later than October 1
- No bringing brush or other refuse for disposal

#### **FINDLAY CEMETERY ASSOCIATION**

The earliest mention of this group's formation was recorded in the minutes of the 1962 meeting. At this time, Henry Davis shared that the Findlay Cemetery Association was organized around 1915 to support the work of the township with cemetery upkeep, procurement of additional land, and aesthetic improvements. Minutes from meetings of inception until 1949 appear to have been lost. Conclusions and the basis of this article have been gleaned from the secretary's minutes records from 1950 until 1980.

Initially this organization was known as the North Ada Cemetery Association, but this was changed in 1954 to its current designation. Annual meetings were held at various members' homes then moved to the township hall before moving to the Egypt Grange Hall in 1951 because they had dishes. Currently meetings are being held at the Les Craig Center at Ada Township Park.

Prior to the business meetings, delicious potlucks were held. Thus, members were given the opportunity to socialize and fellowship together. By the 1950's, fifty to sixty members would attend. That number remained steady until the mid 1990's when membership fell off. Recent meetings show twelve to twenty members in attendance. Membership remains open to anyone who has an interest in Findlay Cemetery and remains current with dues of \$2.00 per family per year.

Selected items of interest from the secretary's minutes of past meetings include the following:

- In 1953, the late Merritt Reeves and Boyd Anderson wrote "The History of Findlay Cemetery." This document was read and accepted by the membership, and was to be kept with other records.
- 2. In 1954, Henry Davis was appointed to work with the county surveyor to have the cemetery surveyed. The cost to the association was \$100.


- 3. In 1955, the association spent \$185 for new signage. Henry Davis and Alice Anderson bought an iron sign with silhouette iron letters.
- 4. In 1959, completion of the cemetery survey was shared with the association. Although, much of the research was done by Henry, members contributed what they knew about burial site locations of their loved ones. A simple system was set up to keep track of burials prior to 1931, and as the cemetery was filled additional data was added.
- 5. In 1964, the cemetery was declared full. The Association officers met with township officials to pursue additional land purchases.
- 6. In 1969, with the township and Association working together, the township eventually purchased two additional acres of land.
- 7. From the 1950's until now, numerous mentions are made with regard to the active involvement of the Association. Members mowed, fertilized, raked, bought and planted trees and shrubbery, and financially assisted the township with fencing and other projects.

Slightly removed from 100 years of existence and service, the Findlay Cemetery Association is proud to have played an active role in the history of Ada Township.

#### **FACILITY USE**

**Park Hours:** Park grounds are open daily dawn to dusk.

**Dog Policy:** Township ordinances require dogs to be on a leash and cleaned up after in all parks.



Motorized recreation vehicles are not allowed on trails.

**Alcohol** is not allowed in the parks or park facilities.

**Walking & Bike Paths:** Located throughout the Township and the Parks. Maps available.

**Facility Reservations and Rentals:** Contact the Park office for scheduling and fees.

Ada Park Shelter & Gazebo: Available April - October.

#### **UPDATES ON ADA TOWNSHIP PARKS**

#### PARK FACILITY RENTAL FEES ADJUSTED

The rates for reserving/renting facilities in the Township parks have gone up to help cover costs and allow for better equity among user groups. Please check with the park office or our web site for details.

#### **ADA PARK TENNIS AND PICKLE BALL COURTS**

This spring and summer the tennis courts at Ada Park will be renovated. The front courts will remain as four tennis courts while the back set will be converted into six pickle ball courts. Completion is expected in mid-late July; courts will be closed until then. A fund-raising campaign is underway to help support this initiative. Contact the park office for details on how you may contribute.

#### **ROSELLE PARK**

Roselle Park flooded twice this year leaving quite a lot of debris on site, a few washouts, and the park quite wet. As part of our updated master plan, we will be working on the non-paved trails in the park. The wet sections in the north trails will get improvements in the late summer and fall to make them more accessible. In addition, a walking path will be created in the meadow north of the building.

#### "SETTLERS GROVE" A.K.A. RIVERSIDE PARK

Construction is well underway along River Street in the Village. Summer work will include finishes to the restroom and school house, bank stabilization along the river, installation of a walkway, table area, playground and stage area. Targeted completion is for late August. A capital campaign for this project is underway through the Envision-Ada initiative. We are thankful to all those supporting this new park.



#### **KNAPP CORNER PRESERVE**

Located at the corner of Grand River Drive and Knapp, this site will soon have a new "Ada Township" entryway sign constructed along with a series of landscape improvements. To assist with stewardship of the site and native plant landscaping, contact the park office.
