ENVISION ADA UPDATES

With the recent completion of the Ada Drive reconstruction project, residents and businesses can look forward to a relatively detour-free autumn season on the public streets in the Village. However, the Village will not be without ongoing construction activity on several private development sites. Among the projects that are likely to be underway this fall are the following:

- Construction of River St. from Headley St. extending north along the riverfront.
- Construction of the first phase of Settlers' Grove Riverfront Park, between River St. and the Thornapple River.
- Opening of the new Kingma's Market at Ada Drive and Fulton Street.
- Ongoing new tenant finishes and occupancy of the Ada Drive Plaza building adjacent to Kingma's Market.
- Completion of the Spectrum Health Integrated Care Center in late 2017 to early 2018.
- Redevelopment of the AGO gas station/convenience store site to include a new combined convenience store/McDonald's Restaurant with drivethrough facilities.
- Residential condominium development by J. Visser Designs on the Bronson St. Residences site, across the service drive from the Post Office.

- Ongoing residential construction at the Riverpoint of Ada development on Ada Drive.
 - Construction of a new restaurant/office building in the redeveloping shopping plaza area for Zeytin Restaurant.
- Completion of the new Vitales Restaurant at Kulross Avenue and Fulton Street.
- Construction of 4 new single family homes at the corner of Ada Drive and Bradfield Street by J. Peterson Homes.

Given the amount of construction activity in the Village, please use caution when driving through the Village and be on the lookout for temporary lane closures, slow moving trucks, etc.

WHAT TO DO WITH YOUR HOUSEHOLD BATTERIES?

The Ada Township Hall "no longer" offers battery drop-off for recycling.

However, household alkaline batteries (AA, AAA, C & D) are all safe to dispose in your trash.

Rechargeable batteries are batteries you use more than once; they are designed for long-term use. You either plug them into a charger or they charge while in the device. Some rechargeable batteries can contain potentially harmful materials, such as heavy metals like, lead, cadmium and nickel. Some heavy metals are hazardous and should not be incinerated or put in the trash. **Rechargeable batteries should always be recycled.**

Utilize one of the Kent County partner battery drop-off sites listed at www.recyclekent.org, including the 20+ in Kent County at www.call2recycle.org. These sites accept rechargeable batteries up to 11 pounds (NO lead acid automotive batteries) and have collection containers inside the locations, generally by the customer service desk......these sites accept rechargeable batteries only – alkaline batteries can safely be placed in your trash.

ADA / CASCADE FALL CLEAN-UP DAY



SOLICITORS

Ada Township has a solicitation ordinance. Anyone wishing to solicit must obtain a permit from the Township Clerk's office. Permits are good for 30 days but can be renewed. There is a \$50 fee for each permit. Background checks are performed on all applicants.

Schools, churches, government, charities, nonprofit or religious organizations are exempt from the permit process but must pre-register with the Clerk's Office. Solicitation dates and times are: April 1 to September 30, 9am – 7pm; October 1 to March 31, 9am – 5pm.

If someone shows up at your door and does not have an Ada Township Solicitation permit attached to their clothing in plain sight, is not respectful to you, or violates the ordinance in any way, please call **Kent County Sheriff's Department at (616) 632-6220 or (616) 632-6100.** Violation of the ordinance is subject to a misdemeanor criminal charge with a fine and/or imprisonment.



OCTOBER IS FIRE PREVENTION MONTH

We offer some simple reminders to help you prevent harm from these causes of fires.....

Electrical fires are often the cause of house fires. Avoid using extension cords and overloading circuits.

A clothes dryer is another cause of house fires. Make sure your dryer vent is cleaned regularly and never leave the house with the dryer operating.



Careless smoking both inside and outside of a house has caused many fires. Make sure that the cigarettes are fully extinguished before discarding.

Portable heaters should be kept a safe distance away from furniture and bedding as well as other combustible products.

What can you do? Have and practice a home fire drill plan. Plan more than one route out of your in house in the event of a fire.

Smoke detectors save lives. Make sure you have working batteries in your smoke detector. Each spring and fall when you change your clocks change your batteries in your detectors. Check the date on your detector; it needs to be replaced if it is older than 10 years old. Each floor of your home should have a smoke detector.

Fire extinguishers are a great addition to every house. An extinguisher is able to put out small fires. **Call 9-1-1 first before** attempting to put out any fire.

Carbon monoxide detectors are a lifesaver and can detect colorless odorless gases which can be deadly.

SPEEDING IN OUR COMMUNITY

Good day Ada residents, this article is regarding speeding in our community.

The Kent County Sheriff's Office receives several calls a day related to vehicles speeding all over Kent County, many of these complaints come



from neighborhoods. Speeding is a concern, and until we all have self-driving cars that can navigate the morning commute, we must pay better attention to how fast we are going.

Numerous factors are considered when determining a speed limit, one of which is the speed that the majority of traffic drives. It was surprising to me that most of us, without paying attention to how fast we are traveling, will drive a reasonable speed. I believe the biggest factor in determining a speed limit is if the location is a residential platte or subdivision. Take a residential subdivision for example, the speed limit is set at 25 MPH. This is because the close proximity of the homes and driveways, including other roadways as well as foot traffic in the area, is taken into consideration. The speed limit is set to be sure it is slow enough to stop quickly.

I have had the opportunity to use a driving simulator that many insurance companies use for distracted driving programs. It is always interesting to watch people participate in operating the simulator while texting or making a phone call. The reaction time is the biggest factor. While in the simulator the person is hyper focused on staying in their lane and not speeding but when they need to stop suddenly or swerve that is when everyone notices that the person does not respond quickly enough.

I understand driving distracted doesn't necessarily mean speeding, but I believe we all are driving distracted. Whether it is kids in the car yelling in the back seat or making that call to the office. Our mind is not focused on driving. Driving is a task that demands focus and attention.

I know we all can agree that we don't want our child involved in a crash. If everyone drives with that thought in mind, I know we can **slow down**, especially in our neighborhood communities.

By now, you should have already received your 2017 summer tax bill. As a reminder, they are **due in** our office by 5:00pm on Thursday, September 14, 2017. Payments received after 5:00pm on September 14, 2017, will incur penalties and interest. If you choose to make a payment online



through your financial institution, please allow 7-10 business days for them to process and mail your check. We do not accept postmarks. f you have any questions pertaining to your 2017 summer taxes, please contact either Gina or myself using the contact information found below

WE SEE THE LIGHT!

Working with the township supervisor, we recently completed converting all of our

fluorescent light bulbs within the township office to light emitting diode (LED) lights. LED lights are the latest technology in energy efficient lighting. The annual operating savings that will be realized by the



township is projected to be just over \$3,000.00. Our electrical consumption will be reduced by over 61%.

In addition to providing cost savings, our conversion to LED lights will decrease air pollution and environmental damage. Annual amounts of carbon dioxide will be reduced by 29,358 pounds, which according to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), has the same effect on the environment as planting 4 acres of trees.

To offset the cost of this conversion, Consumers Energy awarded the township \$1,846.00 through their Business Energy Efficiency Program. With that incentive, the township itself expects to realize a return on its investment in less than two (2) years.

Given these results, we look forward to converting all buildings (fire stations) and street lights within the township to LED lights sometime in the near future.

Elections

While Ada does not anticipate any more elections during 2017, there is much going on behind the scenes. As you may know, the State of Michigan is replacing our more-than-a-decade-old election equipment. Besides our old equipment getting tired, technology has changed. The new equipment has:



- Notable improvements and increased ease of use for voters and election workers
- Allows for electronic storage of ballot images, which will be useful for post-election audits
- Improved election management system software, saving clerks time and money
- Improved options for voters with disabilities

Michigan is dedicated to the integrity of the election system. The State of Michigan is covering much of the cost of the new equipment state-wide, with the remainder the responsibilities of local municipalities.

CEMETERIES

As you may be aware, Ada Township has two public cemeteries available for Ada residents. Ada Cemetery is located on M-21 near Grand River Drive, and Findlay Cemetery is on Two Mile Road in the northern part of the township. It's never too



early to plan ahead, and taking care of some of these decisions can save your family a lot of time and pressure later on. Call the township Clerk's Office for more information regarding cemetery spaces.

FALL LEAF PICK UP

Fall leaf pick-up will be held on **Tuesday**, **October 17** and **Tuesday**, **November 14** this year. This pick-up is available to residents with houses south of Fulton and west of the Grand River. Residents **must** use the special Ada Township leaf bags which are available to purchase at the Ada Township Hall, Treasurer's Office for .75 cents per bag.



When you make a leaf bag purchase, you are put on "the list" for the pick up

service (each season). If you are going to be using leaf bags from last season, it is recommended to call the Ada Township Hall at 616-676-9191 X27, to request a pick up.


ROSELLE PARK MASTER PLAN UPDATED

Over the past few months we have reviewed the Master Plan for Roselle and made a few adjustments. The main changes are in locating a gazebo closer to the new building and playground, upgrading the old parking lot, improving the non-paved trail system, adding accessible picnic areas, adding a maintenance building and restoring a meadow. In addition, the cost estimate and time frame for these future developments are updated. A final public input opportunity will be held at the Ada Township Board meeting on Monday, September 11.

SETTLERS' GROVE – A NEW RIVERSIDE PARK

"Settlers' Grove" is the newest park project in the Village. This will be a new community greenspace alongside the Thornapple River between the

confluence of the
Grand River. This area
is adjacent to the new
Village development
zone and will have
paved trails, sitting
areas, a playground,
amphitheater and
restroom. The old



Carl School house will be adjacent to this park. Construction of the adjacent road and base infrastructure will begin this fall. River bank stabilization and amenities will be completed in 2018.
