

FROM THE SUPERVISOR'S DESK... 2022 in Review

As we approach the end of 2022 it is time to update you on Ada Township highlights from the last year. To begin, the Township Parks and Recreation Department was very busy operating and maintaining Roselle Park, Ada Park, Leonard Field, Legacy Park, and the Township's preservation areas. The new parking lot in Roselle Park became bogged down in state regulations, but it should be done by the time you read this article. An exciting new development

is that this year the Township acquired the right to purchase an additional 3,200 feet of Thornapple River frontage for use as a public park in connection with a mixed unit development proposed on the east side of the river. The acquisition of this river frontage across from Legacy Park by the Township will protect that part of the Thornapple River which runs through the village area. The Township also became involved in a project known as "The Grand River Greenway Trail," and continued its work on improving the river frontage by Leonard Field with construction of those improvements scheduled for 2023. In addition to preserving and improving our parks and rivers, the Township invested significant time and resources constructing a new trail along Pettis from Knapp Street to Chief Hazy Cloud Park, a new trail along Hall Street between Cascade and Spaulding, and repaving a portion of the trail contained in the Grand River Nature Area. Finally, in response to a gypsy moth egg mass survey conducted last year, the Township contracted for a targeted high-tech helicopter gypsy moth spray program which appears to have had a very high success rate in protecting our trees.

This year the Township also continued its partnership with the Ada Historical Society to hold its popular Wednesday night music on the lawn series at the pavilion in Legacy Park. As I reported earlier, the Township also instituted a new social district to enhance the Wednesday night music events, and at the request of the business community the Township Board extended the social district through January 31, 2023. The Township held three "Beers at the Bridge" events and sponsored the Farmer's Market which were very successful. Construction began on an upscale apartment complex on the

east end of the village area, on an upscale hotel in the center of the village area, and on several other new stores, offices, and restaurants.

In August the Township voters approved a public safety millage which is allowing the Fire Department to modernize and upgrade its equipment and invest in training. The Township is also in negotiations with the Sheriff's Department to increase community policing services. The Ada Historical Society highlighted the Fire Department this past year with special programing and a temporary exhibit, "Hometown Heroes: Ada Fire Department". If you have not visited the museum for some time this exhibit is well worth the time. The Township also continued to work with KDL on the library, and the reports we receive from KDL on the use of the library are outstanding. The Ada Downtown Development Authority worked closely with the Ada Business Association and others on additional community events and physical improvements to the village area. The Township sponsored a 4th of July parade, car show, music, and fireworks, along with softball, pickleball, and other cultural events through the parks department and in coordination with our community partners. Finally, the Planning Commission, ZBA, DDA, DDA Citizens Council, Trail Committee, PLRP and other Township Boards and Committees were busy this year, and all supported by the hard work of the Township staff.

On behalf of the Ada Township Board, I am pleased to report to you again that as we approach the end of 2022 Ada Township continues to be filled with energy and excitement for finishing this year and looking forward to next year. We are thankful for the blessings on Ada in 2022, and we wish all of you a prosperous and peaceful 2023.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHNICIAN TRAINING

The Fire Department has begun the first steps in becoming an EMT licensed department. In January, our crews will be training at the next level of medical care. Once completed, our medical response units will be outfitted with the upgraded equipment to operate at the EMT level. What does this mean for you? Once licensed, our medical units with be outfitted with Epi pens for allergic reactions, medications for both advanced breathing treatments and cardiac events. This will allow for advanced treatments to be performed prior to the arrival of an ambulance.



KENT COUNTY SHERIFF OFFICE NEWS –

Greetings from your Community Police Officer,

Believe it or not winter is among us! DON'T BLAME THE WEATHER this winter and follow some tips when driving during the winter months.

Drive Slow on Ice and Snow:

 It can take up to ten times longer to stop your vehicle on snowy and/ or icy roads. Slow down and allow more room between your vehicle and



the one ahead of you. This gives you more time to react and brake, reducing your crash risk.

- Put your turn signal on sooner than you would in warm weather months. Remember, it takes longer for the cars behind you to react and stop, too.
- Avoid distractions now more than ever. Taking your eyes off the road for even a few seconds robs you of precious reaction time. Put your phone away and don't try to multitask (eating, putting on makeup, etc.).
- Avoid a ticket. Michigan laws require drivers to move at a speed that is "reasonable and proper" for the road conditions. Even if you are driving at or below the speed limit, you could get a speeding ticket if the road conditions make that speed unreasonable for safe driving.

Be Prepared:

Winterize Your Car

 A well-maintained
 car is a safer car. Have
 your mechanic check
 fluid levels (oil, wiper
 fluid, antifreeze, etc.)
 and ensure that the



following items are in good working order: Battery, Ignition system, Lights, Brakes, Heater/defroster, Wipers.

• Remove all snow and ice from your vehicle, not just from all windows and the windshield, but also from mirrors, headlights, taillights, and the roof of the car. Snow, ice and dirt buildup can dim the beams of lights and reduce visibility, and snow and ice from the roof can fall onto your windshield and block your view on the road. Clearing your car is important to protect others as well. In fact, it's the law: If snow or ice from your vehicle impairs the vision of other drivers by hitting their windshields, the road or the shoulder, you could be hit with a hefty fine.

As a reminder, do not leave running vehicles unattended. If you choose to warm up your vehicles, lock the doors or, better yet, remove the keys and only use the remote start. Thieves target gas stations, day care centers and other places people tend to leave their vehicle running.

Trails Update - 2022 Wrap Up and Looking Ahead to 2023

It was a busy year for trail work and I would anticipate the same for the next few years as the Township works hard to utilize trail millage funds to expand and improve the trail network. An update on 2022 projects is included below as well as a look ahead to 2023.

2022 Construction Project Updates:

- Pettis Ave. Trail Phase I The Township completed construction of a new 4.2-mile section of non-motorized path from Knapp St. to the entrance of Kent County's Chief Hazy Cloud Park. The Township is currently completing design engineering on Phase II of the Pettis Ave. trail which would complete the stretch of trail between Chief Hazy Cloud and Vergennes St. allowing users of this trail to travel to the downtown.
- Hall St./Cascade Rd./Spaulding Connector The Township completed construction of this small stretch of nonmotorized path connecting Hall Street near the Consumers Energy Trail with the sidewalk on Spaulding. This will allow residents to travel west on Cascade Rd. without having to cross both Hall St. and Cascade Rd.
- The Township had hoped to construct the Kamp Twins connector trail between Fase St. and Buttrick Ave., but this project is delayed slightly due to some railroad permitting issues. It is anticipated these issues will be resolved shortly and allow for construction in 2023.
- The repaving of the Ada Dr. path and the Grand River Nature Area path were completed and we apologize for the inconvenience to residents and property owners as we worked with the contractor to make sure the quality of this project met our standards.

Looking Ahead to 2023:

 Wayfinding – The Township is working with Corbin Design to create a wayfinding signage plan for the Township trail network that will provide directional signage, information kiosks, maps, and mileage markers throughout the network. This will allow the Township to communicate to trail users about everything Ada has to offer. It is anticipated these signs could be installed in 2023 if the project moves forward without delays.

- Potential Construction Projects One highlighted project will include a path underneath the Fulton St. bridge at the Grand River providing an additional connection for residents to travel from Legacy Park to the north side of Fulton without crossing at a surface crossing. The Township is also exploring Phase II of the Pettis Ave. trail to connect the phase under construction currently to Vergennes St., a path on Rix from Ada Dr. to Adaridge as well as looking at the other segments that will provide maximum connectivity for residents.
- The Trail Committee is constantly reviewing the feasibility of larger projects to eliminate missing connections and provide better access throughout the Township. This work will continue in 2023 and beyond to ensure the most impactful projects are being completed.
- Staff will be working on a list of large repairs throughout the existing system. This will be done as an annual process to make sure the Township is properly maintaining the system, not only building new paths.

Master Plan Process Continues: A Vision for Ada Identified!

With the participation of many people in the community, Ada Township and its Master Plan consultant Progressive AE are continuing work on the Township's new Master Plan. The Master Plan is a policy document that provides guidance on how future growth will occur in the community. The level of public involvement so far, with over 500 people providing input, has resulted in a very successful Master Plan process. Public input during the summer of 2022 began with open and inclusive conversations through focus group meetings, pop-up events (at the Music on the Lawn and Farmers Market), and an online community survey, all of which culminated in an August 16, 2022 community vision writing event.


The issues, opportunities, and feedback gathered at the events and through the survey were synthesized into four themes: mobility, community building, housing, and natural features. The August 16 vision writing event provided an opportunity for participants to review input gathered to date, which was sorted into four themes, and then collaborate to develop vision statements and goals, focused on Ada's future success, for each theme as listed below. These themes will provide a solid foundation for the development of the Master Plan.

Mobility

- Ensure safe pedestrian movement in Ada Township.
- Accelerate implementation of Connect Ada Non-Motorized Plan to create safe movements throughout the Township.
- Educate residents, businesses, and visitors on parking availability and continue to evaluate parking needs as the Township grows.

Community Building

- Partner with local entities to make the Township a destination.
- Continue implementation of wayfinding and action plans to address physical barriers.
- Increase coordination with schools to improve safety and access.
- Incentivize adaptive reuse of historic structures.
- Draw a diversity of businesses and options to sustain economic balance of the community.



Housing

 The community will be a welcoming, inclusive location that provides opportunities for multiple, attainable housing types.

Natural Features

- To continue to preserve and value greenspace as the Township develops. Add more greenery and preserve pockets of greenspace in the village area as it continues to develop.
- Increase connectivity to natural features, especially the rivers, and continue to add activities that utilize natural resources. Add additional trails and connect existing trails together.

Building on these four themes, the next step in the process, the November 2, 2022 community event, allowed discussion and identification of the following topics:

- Ada's Key Gateways: Identifying locations that distinguish arrival to the Township.
- Discuss Placemaking on the Fulton Corridor: Defining and locating placemaking opportunities along the Corridor.
- Living in the Built Environment: Crafting the framework for gentle density and incremental development in the Township.

In the coming phases, the Master Planning process will continue by preparing and evaluating alternative future land use scenarios based on the themes noted above, and incorporating related policies towards translating these into implementation action strategies. We are on our way to creating a living document that reflects the community's vision for Ada Township!

The Ada Barbershop and Plumfield Books operate today out of a quintessentially mid-century modern building with a flat roof and rigid geometric lines. The other mid-century building that existed for about 40 years at the north corner of Thornapple River and Ada Drives was the town hall, seen here in 1966. It housed Ada Township offices, a library, and the fire department. It was built on the site of the former Ada Hotel and occupied from about 1948 to 1990. After that, the Township hall moved to its current location which was previously the Ada Congregational church.

Spongy (Gypsy) Moth Update for 2023

Last year around this time the Township was gearing up for its Egg Mass Survey with Aquatic Consulting Services. That survey ultimately led to a plan of action with the Township spraying for Spongy moths in the spring of 2022. The Township has again contracted for an egg mass survey for the upcoming year and anticipates the results to be available in early December. Once the survey is complete the Township will better understand the full impact and damage of the Spongy Moths, which can aid in creation of a plan for treatment in the spring of 2023.

Property owners who will be impacted by this would be notified that their property has been identified on the list of potential properties to be sprayed.
