"I Remember"



When the Kent County airport was graded and built, the tamarack trees in a large swamp were cut down and the swamp was filled in. Tamarack swamps are not very common in this area, and this swamp always harbored deer and other wildlife.

When the I-96 interchange was built on 28th Street, a small swamp on the north side of the road was filled in. This was the home of that lovely evergreen vine, the trailing arbutus. Many years ago, Cora and Virginia Oates would carry small sprays of this plant to school when it blossomed in the spring. The tiny flowers were very fragrant.

Until very recently, the rare fringed gentian could be seen in swampy areas along the banks of Cascade's School Creek. There is no mistaking this lovely blue, fall-blooming flower. We often see the more common bottle gentian in the fall while visiting Ludington State Park.

I never see the birdfoot violet now, but when we were kids hiking to Schuman School, we picked what we called same pansies in the roadside along Kraft Avenue. I scan the roadside carefully every spring, but the pansies are gone.

I must confess to being a rather lazy observer of nature, never going too far afield. Usually just walking to the mailbox or working in the yard or garden. But all the sights, sounds, and smells are there to be taken in by anyone who is a seeker.

On one early summer trip to the mailbox you might see five different kinds of clover: white and yellow sweet clover, alsike, red clover, and tiny clumps of hop clover, so dearly loved by the rabbits. Hawkweed, dandelions, chicory, blue flags and even Deptford pinks, blue-eyed grass, and harebell. All grow along the driveway. And would you like a bouquet of yellow and blue violets or pussytoes?

I have often wondered how the flowers acquired their common names. Someone self-evident, such as heal-all or smartweed. I once read that joe-pye weed was named after an old Indian called Joe Pye. But names as mugwort, loosestrife, viper's bugloss and dogbane really have me stumped.

It seems the increased daylight hours have triggered a roaring case of spring fever in me. I can hardly wait! Buy a good wildflower guide and join me.

Assessment Change Notices were mailed the week of February 18th, 2008. If you have not receive your assessment notice please call the Assessor's Office at (616) 676-9191 ext: 26.

Your Assessment Change Notice contains valuable information that you should review. In addition to the change of assessment, the notice will indicate:

- If there was a transfer of ownership
- If there is a Principal Residence Exemption for 2008

The **Board of Review** heard assessment appeals on March 10th and 11th

- Appointments were made by contacting the Assessor's Office
- Sales Data and Neighborhood Sales Maps are available for review.
- Letters of Appeal are accepted and received on or before March 10th.
- An appeal to the Board of Review, either in person or by letter, is a prerequisite for an appeal to the Michigan Tax Tribunal.

Taxable Value Cap:

It is the taxable value that is capped by Proposal A – not the assessed value. The taxable value is used to calculate your taxes



and is capped at the lesser of the Consumer Price Index (rate of inflation) or 5%, unless there was a transfer of ownership in 2007, any new construction, property inspections, reappraisal changes or any other omitted real property. If there was a transfer of ownership on your property in 2007, your assessed value and taxable value will be the same in 2008 because the taxable value was uncapped.

Rate of Inflation:

The 2008 CPI (Consumer Price Index) established by the State of Michigan is 2.3%

Other items of interest:

- Your taxable value can never exceed your assessed value.
- It is your responsibility as a taxpayer to review your property record card periodically to be sure you agree with all of the information that is currently on record.
- The Assessor is not permitted by State Law to automatically set your new assessment at one half of your purchase price.

Changes to Assessing Rules Recognize Declining Property Values

Last March, many people were a bit shocked when they received their new property assessment notices. Everyone knows that real estate values are headed down, but assessments in many cases were still headed up. Property owners need to be aware that, because of some changes in the rules at the state level on how property is assessed, declining home values will be better reflected in this year's assessments.

Under normal circumstances, property is assessed based on a sales study that covers a two year time span. This means that the assessor is looking at home sales that occurred in the past six to 30 months. When housing prices are going up, this practice actually keeps property assessments lower than if only more recent sales were studied. Unfortunately, when housing values start going down, it can take more than a year before the sales study will reflect this trend. However, the state has changed the rules to allow assessors to react to a declining housing market.

For this year's assessment, assessors will be allowed to use sales studies that reflect housing values that existed between October 2006 and September 2007. This means that the assessment recognizes the declining values much quicker than occurred in prior years. The assessments should more accurately reflect the value of the home in today's real estate market.

Does this mean that my property taxes go down?

When a property owner receives their property assessment in March, they will see two numbers on the assessment notice: the state equalized value (SEV) and the taxable value. The SEV represents 50 percent of the true cash value as required by the state constitution and law. This value goes up or down without limit based on market conditions. Prior to 1994, this was the number used to calculate property tax bills.

When Proposal A passed in 1994, our state constitution was amended to say that a property owner should not pay property taxes on property values that were going up more than the rate of inflation or 5 percent, whichever is less. For more than a decade, the property taxes paid by property owners have been going up by only inflation, except for voter-approved increases in property taxes or because something was added to the property, such as a new garage.

For many property owners, a large gap has developed between the SEV and capped value reflected in the taxable value. This gap demonstrates the benefit to long-term property owners created under Proposal A. When Proposal A was created, a cap was placed on how fast taxes could go up; it did not automatically reduce taxes when property values were heading down. If you have been in your home for a long period of time, it is unlikely that the actual property tax bill will go down even if the SEV goes down. Taxes will not go down until the SEV falls below the taxable value. For many long-term property owners the SEV is 30 percent or more above the taxable value. Housing values would need to go down 30 percent or more before most would see their property tax bills go down.

For those who have recently purchased property, they are much more likely to see actual reductions in property tax bills based on a declining housing market. Under Proposal A, when property sells, the cap comes off of the taxable value, and the SEV and taxable value are the same in the first year after sale. For those property owners where the SEV and taxable value are very close or equal, a reduction in the SEV can also mean a reduction in the taxable value-and thus a reduction in property taxes.

A Citizen's Guide to Lawn Care

Using healthy lawn care practices is one step toward cleaner streams and lakes—even if you don't have waterfront property.

Tips for Mowing

Taller grass means a healthier lawn, and it's easier to maintain! Set your mower blade to leave about three inches of grass. Taller grass cools the soil, needs less water, and shades out weed growth. It's also more insect and disease resistant. Vary the direction of lawn mowing periodically to prevent wear patterns and soil compaction.

Tips for Watering

Excessive watering is wasteful! Conserve water by using only what your lawn needs.

- 15-20 minutes of sprinkling daily is better than a few heavy waterings throughout the week, according to research by Michigan State University.
- If daily watering is impractical, 30-40 minutes of watering every other day is sufficient.
- Make sure your sprinkler is watering your lawn—not your driveway or sidewalk!

Don't Guess... Soil Test!

Don't assume your yard needs fertilizer. Perform a soil test. You'll save money and reduce the chance of over-applying by only replacing the nutrients your soil needs. Michigan State University Extension offers soil nutrient testing for a nominal fee. To find out more, call the extension office in your area: 616-366-3265 (Kent County) or 616-846-8250 (Ottawa County).

Choose the Correct Fertilizer

Over-fertilizing can contribute excessive amounts of pollutants to streams and lakes throughout the storm sewer. Without realizing it, many landowners are applying fertilizers and pesticides when their lawns don't even need them!

If you do choose to fertilize, use slow-release fertilizers that provide a slow, steady source of nutrients for plants. This also prevents the big spurt of growth common with synthetic fertilizers. Slow-release fertilizers come in a variety of types, including organic, time-release, and coated.

Avoid "weed-and-feed" mixtures, which contain herbicide to control weed growth and are often applied where they are not needed. If healthy lawn care practices (correct mowing height and



watering) are followed, weed control should not be necessary. Be sure your mower is set to three inches to help shade out unwanted weeds.

Tornado: Plan to Survive!

The safest place to be in Tornado is underground, preferably under something sturdy such as a workbench.

If there is no basement in your home, a small room in the center of the home, such as a bathroom or closet, is best.

In a Car: Never try to out run a tornado. If you see a funnel cloud or hear a tornado warning issue on the radio or by a siren, get out of your vehicle, seek a safe structure or lie as flat as possible in a low area with your hands covering the back part of your head and neck.

Always check the emergency shelter plans of the building you enter. If you cannot locate one, ask the establishment that you visit to please furnish one by the entry doors as a courtesy for their customers. If none are available always move to an interior hall or small room on the lowest floor of the building and lie flat.

Be Aware! Stay Alive!

*Always know where the emergency exits are where-ever you are. Most public buildings have a diagram of emergency exits; if not, each exit should be lit.
