Barn Quilt Block



A daughter's idea to honor her mother's heritage and love of quilts by painting a single quilt square on the family barn has developed in to THE BARN QUILT BLOCK TRAILS in every state of the union. It started in

Adams County Ohio in 2001 with one quilt block and has now grown to over 6,000 in the US and Canada. "Volunteers see them as an opportunity to contribute to the community in a fun and visible way. Farmers see them as a way to get people into the countryside, share their love of the land, and honor someone in their family" according to writer Jim Winnerman.

AHS has caught the bug and will soon be installing a quilt block on our own historic barn! The design chosen comes from a quilt in our collections that belonged to Ada resident, Alice Pelon Perkins Clouse. The barn overlooks the house in which Alice lived at 7100 Thornapple River Dr. A local Ladies Aid Society crafted the quilt and the quilters' names are hand-written in each square. It was a gift to Alice in 1918 after the death of her husband from influenza and subsequent birth of their first child.

For all you quilters out there – the pattern is a split ninepatch album block. Many thanks go to our volunteer master gardener, Carol Penninga, for this meaningful addition to the village!

AUGUST PRIMARY: Tuesday, August 5, 2014

NOVEMBER GENERAL: Tuesday, November 4, 2014

<u>**To Register</u>** to vote in Ada Township: You must be a US Citizen, at least 18 years old by Election Day, and a resident of Michigan and Ada Township.</u>

How: You can register to vote for federal, state and local elections by mail; at the county or township clerk's office; or by visiting any Secretary of State office. You may also register at the same time you renew your driver's license by mail. Eligible drivers receive a voter registration application in the mail with their driver's license renewal information.

<u>Change of Address</u>: If you move *within* a city or township, you must update your address by going to your local clerk, Secretary of State Office or online at <u>ExpressSOS.com</u>. Whenever you move to a *new city or township*, you must re-register to vote.

Ada Township has three (3) polling locations:

St. Roberts of Newminster Parish, 6477 Ada Dr.: Precincts 1, 2, 6 and 7

First Congregational Church of Ada, 6330 Ada Dr.: Precincts 3, 4 and 8

Ada Township Fire Station #2, 7211 Knapp St.: Precinct 5

(If you are unsure which Precinct you vote in, check your voter-registration card or call the Ada Township Clerk's office at 676-9191 ext. 20).

<u>Voter ID Requirement:</u> To Vote, state law requires you to either show picture ID or sign an affidavit attesting that

you are not in possession of picture ID. Acceptable picture ID includes: a Michigan driver's license



or state ID card. Also, any current driver's license or state ID card issued by another state, a federal or state governmentissued photo ID, a U.S. passport, a military ID card with photo, a tribal ID card with photo or a student ID with photo from a high school or college can be used.

Absentee Ballots: You may vote by absentee ballot if you:

- Are unable to attend the polls without assistance;
- Are age 60 or older;
- Expect to be absent from your city or township for the entire time the polls are open on Election Day;
- Are in jail awaiting arraignment or trial;
- Have been assigned to work as a precinct inspector in a precinct other than where you are a registered voter; or
- Are unable to attend the polls because of religious beliefs.

If you qualify for an absentee ballot, you need to notify the township clerk's office in writing that you want an absentee ballot (email is acceptable: <u>dthompson@adatownshipmi.com</u>). An absentee ballot application will be given or sent to you.

If you are not already registered to vote in Ada Township, the last days you can register to be able to vote in the upcoming elections are:

July 7 for the August primary election

October 6 for the November general election

FIELD REVIEW NOTICE

The Assessor is required to appraise, for tax purposes, all real and personal property within the Township. Michigan Statute requires that all property be evaluated annually based on current market conditions. This evaluation requires an inspection of each property in the Township.

This includes measuring all buildings and other property improvements on the property, taking current digital photos of the property, verifying the buildings current physical condition reviewing the amenities present, and interviewing the property owners to determine bedrooms, baths, and type of basement, etc.

The State of Michigan has recommended that 20% of properties in a governmental unit be visited each year to review assessment record accuracy and to ensure that properties are being appraised and assessed at 50% of the market value. In efforts to continually improve our excellent standards, the Assessor's office strives to enhance the annual review process and better meet or exceed the State of Michigan's expectations. The goal is that the Assessing office will review at least 20% a year of the Township, then every single property is visited at least once every 5 years.

If one of the inspectors from the Township arrives wearing a Township issued I.D. badge and carrying a clipboard and digital camera and knocks on your door requesting to review your property, please welcome them. Accurate assessments benefit everyone in the community.

TAX PAYMENT METHODS

Tax bills are scheduled to be mailed out July 1, 2014. These bills are due by September 15, 2014, 5:00 p.m. If you have not received a copy please give our office a call. We will be happy to reprint and mail or e-mail one to you. Remember the Township **DOES NOT** accept postmarks as date received. You have several options in paying your bill:

- As always you may come into the Township offices Monday – Friday 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. except for holidays when the offices are closed. There is a driveup drop box located at the end of the sidewalk at the Thornapple River Dr. entrance to the Township offices.
- You can sign up for ACH, which allows the Township's bank to deduct payment from your bank. Call our offices for more information. Forms are also available on our website.
- You can also make payments with a credit card by logging onto our website: <u>www.adatownshipmi.com</u>, or call 1-888-891-6064 (press 1). See the back of tax bill for further instructions. *WE NOW ACCEPT CREDIT CARDS AT THE TOWNSHIP OFFICES*. There is a fee of <u>3% of the tax bill</u> charged by the credit card clearinghouse for any credit card transaction.
- You can mail your payment to our office by using the enclosed envelope. *REMEMBER THAT POSTMARKS ARE NOT ACCEPTED AS DATE RECEIVED. ALL PAYMENTS MUST BE IN OUR OFFICE BY SEPTEMBER 15, 2014, 5:00 p.m. TO BE CONSIDERED ON TIME.*
- The Township <u>does accept</u> partial payments starting on July 1st when tax bills are released. Appropriate interest/penalties will apply to the <u>unpaid balance</u> after September 15th.



SENIORS AND DISABLED CITIZENS OF ADA TOWNSHIP

Please take note: you can apply for a deferment for 2014 summer tax if your household income did not exceed \$40,000 for the preceding calendar year and you meet at least one of the following requirements:

- You are 62 years or older
- Paraplegic or Quadriplegic
- Eligible serviceperson, veteran widow or widower
- Blind person
- ^a Totally and permanently disabled

If you had a deferment for 2013 a form has been automatically mailed to you.You many pick up a form at the Township Treasurer's Office at 7330 Thornapple River Dr. or call (616) 676-9191 ext. 27 to have a form mailed to you. The form is due September 15, 2014 by 5:00 p.m.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE THE VICTIM OF IDENTITY THEFT

Identity theft is a common form of fraud that takes place when someone without your permission acquires goods or services in your name. This crime is averaging 15 million victims a year in the United States and a total of 50 billion in loses. Ouch!!

I thought that might warrant me telling you what to do if you are made aware that your Identity may have been stolen.

- File a police report with your local law enforcement agency. Get that complaint number because you will need it later.
- Run your credit report. Check for any suspicious charges. This should be done annually as many times it takes months to years for you to know your identity was stolen.
- Contact the 3 credit bureaus and advised them your identity was stolen and they will ask you for the police report number. Tell them of the suspicious charges on your credit report and that you did not charge them.
- Check bank statements as well as credit report and dispute any transaction that you personally did not make. Cancel any credit or accounts that you did not open.
- Change your passwords and pins as well as get new credit and debit cards.
- Contact the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) request Identity theft affidavit form.
- Last, be diligent, as this is a long process with several parties involved. Keep communicating with the parties involved to resolve the issue as quick as you can.

COMSUMPTION AND CONSERVATION



Americans drink more than 1billion glasses of tap water per day.

On average, 50 to 70 percent of home water is used outdoors for watering lawns and gardens.

Daily indoor per capita water use in the typical single family home with no water-conserving fixtures is 74 gallons. Here's how it breaks down

Use	Gallons per Capita	% of Total Daily Use
Showers	12.6	17.3%
Clothes Washers	15.1	20.9%
Dishwashers	1.0	1.3%
Toilets	20.1	27.7%
Baths	1.2	2.1%
Leaks	10.0	13.8%

Other Uses	1.5	2.1%

By installing more efficient water fixtures and regularly checking for leaks, households can reduce daily per capita water use by about 30% to approximately 51.9 gallons per day. Here's how it breaks down for households using conservation measures:

If all US households install.ed water-savi ng features, water use would decrease by 30 percent, saving an estimated 5.4 billion gallons per day. This would result indollar-volume savings of \$11.3 million per day or more than \$4 billion per year.

PROTECT YOUR FAMILY?

A recent study by the National Fire Protection Association, an internationally recognized organization, found that a couple of \$25 Smoke Detectors could have saved 14,480 lives nationwide between 2007 and 2010. Read the article below to see how easy it is to protect your family from a horrific death in a house fire.

"April 7, 2014 – Three out of five home fire deaths in 2007-2011 resulted from fires in properties without working smoke alarms, according to the report "<u>Smoke</u> <u>Alarms in U.S. Home Fires</u>," released by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). The report examines the number of reported fires in U.S. households with and



without working smoke alarms, as well as the effectiveness of smoke alarms in preventing fire-related deaths.

"Working smoke alarms in homes are key to saving lives from fire," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of outreach and advocacy. "You may have as little as three minutes to get out before a fire becomes deadly. The early warning provided by smoke alarms gives you critical time to escape safely."

Key findings from the report include:

- The death rate was twice as high in homes that did not have any working smoke alarms as it was in home fires with working smoke alarms.
- More than one-third of home fire deaths resulted from fires in properties with no smoke alarms while one-quarter were caused by fires in which a smoke alarm was present but did not operate.
- In reported home fires in which smoke alarms were present but did not operate, almost half (47 percent) of the smoke alarms had missing or disconnected batteries and one-quarter (24 percent) had dead batteries.
- Many homes do not have the protection required in recent editions of <u>NFPA 72®</u>, <u>National Fire Alarm and Signaling</u> <u>Code</u>, which requires interconnected smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home.

NFPA recommends:

- Installing smoke alarms inside every bedroom, outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- For the best protection, interconnecting all smoke alarms so when one sounds they all sound.
- Using both photoelectric and ionization smoke alarms or combination ionization and photoelectric alarms, also known as dual sensor alarms. An ionization smoke alarm is generally more responsive to flaming fires and a photoelectric smoke alarm is generally more responsive to smoldering fires.
- Replacing all smoke alarms every 10 years or sooner if they do not respond properly when tested.
- Testing all smoke alarms at least once a month by using the test button."

Township ordinances require dogs to be on a leash and cleaned up after in all parks.

Motorized recreation vehicles are not allowed.

Ada Park Shelter & Gazebo Rentals and Reservations: Available April through October. For rates, availability, use policies or reservations, contact the Park office.

Athletic Fields: Baseball & soccer fields at Ada Park and Leonard Field are used in the spring, summer and fall for area leagues and instructional programs. Contact the Park office for information, schedules or reservations.

Basketball & Tennis Courts at Ada Park are open to the public except during scheduled lessons and programs. Tennis Courts #5 and #6 are set up for Pickle Ball. Check with the office for schedules or to reserve a time.

Update on Ada Township Parks & Preserves

With the generous support of our community, we have been able to move forward on several projects at the Parks and Open Space Properties.

For Ada Township Park, a 3.3 acres parcel adjacent to the park was acquired last fall. After some restoration work on it, this area will be maintained as a natural area and bike path access. This spring the cracks in the tennis courts were patched. The courts were built in 1979 and a complete renovation is planned in the next couple years. We will soon be paving the gravel parking lot adjacent to Grand River Drive. This will make that parking area more accessible and available for year round use.



For Roselle Park, we are moving forward on several projects. Thanks to several community donors we have finished up the new playground area near the silo. It includes climbing and "natural" style play structures, new climbing hand holds and routes on the silo and access to the stream. The new entryway and parking area across from Michigan Street was established last fall. This area is now open for use and will be until the winter. The design phase for the resource building for the Park is currently underway. Drafts of the design concepts are available through the Park Office and public input is welcome. Opportunities for donating toward that building or other aspects of the park are available. We hope that construction will be started in the spring of 2015.

At the **Carl Creek Crossing Preserve** on Grand River Drive a new foot bridge is being put in to enable a safe crossing of the Creek as you enter the site. Walking paths are open on the site now.
