### **Veterans Remembered**

Take a stroll through either one of Ada's cemeteries, Findlay, located on 2 Mile Road or Ada Cemetery, located on Fulton Street. Notice the American flags proudly displayed on numerous

gravesites in both cemeteries. The flags denote the graves of veterans from this area who served in the Civil War, Mexican-American War, World War I World War II, Korea, and Vietnam.

There are more than eighty gravesites so designated. Twelve from the Civil War, one from the Mexican-

American War, twenty four from World War I, thirty nine from World War II, four from the Korean War, and three from the Vietnam War.

Among the honored veterans are four killed in World War I. They are Adrian Davidse, Clarence Hill, Peter Jasperse, Jr., and Frank Cole. There is a plaque hanging in the Averill Historical Museum of Ada honoring these men and also Robert Stevens, Jasper Spidell, Leland Swan, Frank Kamp, Orlo Myers, Harry Gould, Rollen Fraser, Daniel Cooper and John Boss, all of whom sacrificed their lives in World War II.

These men gave their lives so that all of us and our descendants could have a safer life and they had high hopes for a peaceful world.

Then, there are those still among us who performed indescribable acts of bravery, such as Bruce Roark, who served in Vietnam. A Marine veteran, Bruce was with five companies of Marines on a hill two miles west of Khe Sanh when the Communists attacked. Bruce saved the lives of many of his fellow soldiers by using a grenade launcher like a baseball bat to knock grenades back to the enemy.

He also charged a mortar pit and knocked it out, receiving two wounds in the process. He was evacuated to a hospital ship for treatment of his wounds, where he also received a commendation for saving the lives of his men.



Don't forget these men and the sacrifices they made. In the Averill Historical Museum of Ada they are being especially remembered during Memorial Day and the Fourth of July celebrations.

You will also find a Civil War discharge document, posters requesting food for Europe and war bonds for World War I; a photo of Max Souzer who served in World War I and World War II, and the flag from "The Michigan," a ship he served on in the early 1900s.

There is a blue star from World War II that was hung in a family's window to signify a family member in service to their country. A gold star signified that the service man or woman had been killed. This tradition of displaying the blue or gold stars has begun again in the latest war with Iraq.

Take time to quietly stroll through one or both of our lovely cemeteries and remember those who gave their lives for us.

### Roselle Park Master Planning Underway

Efforts are now underway by a 7-member Steering Committee to prepare an overall Master Plan for the development of Roselle Park on Grand River Dr. The Township Board recently approved a contract with a consultant team headed up by park planning and design firm O'Boyle, Cowell, Blalock & Associates, to assist in preparing plans for the park.

In addition to park planning and design expertise, the consultant team includes architects to help assess whether any existing buildings or structures on the park site are suitable for re-use, a team of biological experts to assess plant and animal habitat on the property, and engineers to evaluate floodplain constraints on development of park facilities.

Watch for future public announcements in the news media and at the Township offices regarding upcoming public input opportunities.

Demolition work is also underway to remove a fire-damaged cattle barn at the rear of the processing plant. As plans for the park take shape, it is hoped that additional demolition can be completed this year to remove additional buildings on the property.

## News from Ada Park

Softball season is well underway and we're still wondering when warmer temperatures are going to arrive. It has been another crazy spring weather-wise but that hasn't interfered with the activities at Ada Park and Leonard Field. Summer programs will soon be underway and before we know it, the summer will be over and we'll be wondering where it went!

Unfortunately our tennis instructor, Anne Sukup, is not available to teach tennis lessons this summer. She has a good reason. Anne will be busy planning her wedding that will take place this fall! Congratulations go out to Anne and her future husband on the upcoming nuptials.

### Attention Fishermen!

Last summer we were able to eliminate two of the pike from the Ada Park ponds. One was 28" and the other was 27"! Unfortunately, they weren't the only ones in the pond. There are still two large pike that we know of. One is larger than those caught last year and one is slightly smaller. If you fish at Ada Park and happen to catch a pike of any size, please do not throw it back in. We need to eliminate the pike before we can restock the pond with bluegill. If you happen to catch any pike larger than 18", please notify Wendy at the Park Office.

### **Parks Department** Expanding

You've probably heard the news about the former Ada Beef property becoming the new Roselle Park. Recently the firm of O'Boyle, Cowell, Blalock & Associates was hired by the Township to develop the master plan for the 236-acre park. Part of this planning process will involve public meetings where you will be able to give your input for what you'd like to see there. Most of the property is flood plain, but approximately 20-acres can be developed. Watch the local newspapers for announcements of public meetings. We hope to have a finalized plan in October.

### From the Desk of the Clerk Happy Birthday America!

Independence Day commemorates the signing of the Carolina-voted No, Delaware undecided and New York Declaration of Independence by the Continental Congress on abstained. July 4, 1776, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

To make it official John Hancock, President of the Continental The United States consisted of 13 colonies under the rule of Congress, signed the Declaration of Independence. It is said that England's King George III. There was growing unrest among John Hancock signed his name "with a great flourish" so "King the colonists concerning the practice of "Taxation without George can read that without spectacles!" Representation." This terminology was used because colonists did not have any representation in the English Parliament and The following day copies of the Declaration were distributed. had no say in what went on. As the unrest grew King George The first newspaper to print the Declaration was the sent additional troops to control any rebellion. In 1774 the Pennsylvania Evening Post on July 6, 1776. On July 8th the 13 colonies sent delegates to Philadelphia,

Pennsylvania to form the First Continental Congress. In 1774 most colonists were unhappy with the oppression of England but were not convinced taking up arms against the Motherland was the answer.

However in April 1775 the King's troops advanced on Concord Massachusetts. Paul Revere would sound the alarm that "The British are coming", and even though Paul Revere never rode through the towns crying out "The British are coming," he played a crucial part in the American Revolution and the battle of Concord and its "shot heard round the world." This would mark the unofficial beginning of the colonies' war for Independence.

The following May the colonies again sent delegates to the Second Continental Congress. For almost a year the congress tried to work out its differences with England, without formally declaring war.

By June 1776 it was evident that peaceful efforts were hopeless and a committee was formed to compose a formal declaration of independence. Headed by Thomas Jefferson, the committee included John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Philip Livingston and Roger Sherman. Thomas Jefferson was chosen to write the first draft, which was presented to the congress on June 28. Changes were made, including the Southern Colonies refusing to sign anything that would abolish slavery. Jefferson was irate stating that anything that dealt with independence but did not abolish slavery was a mockery and refused to sign. However, John Adams (at that time more of an adversary to Jefferson than a friend) convinced Jefferson it was most important to gain Independence from England; then the battle of slavery and other issues could be addressed. A vote was taken late in the afternoon of July 4th. Of the 13 colonies, 9 voted in favor of the Declaration, 2-Pennsylvania and South



Declaration had its first public reading in Philadelphia's Independence Square. Twice that day the Declaration was read to cheering crowds and the ring of all the church bells. The bell in Independence Hall known as the "Province Bell" was later renamed the "Liberty Bell" and it too was rung to "Proclaim Liberty Throughout All the Land Unto All the Inhabitants Thereof."

And although the signing of the Declaration was not completed until August, the 4th of July has been accepted as the official anniversary of United States independence. The first Independence Day celebration took place the following year-July 4 1777, hence 227 years later we still celebrate our Independence, Americas' Birthday every 4th of July!!
